Program Summary



Family AIDS Care and Education Services (FACES) is a family-focused, comprehensive HIV prevention, care, and treatment program with 62 supported HIV sites in Nyanza and Nairobi; 62 PPCT sites in Nyanza; and 12 male circumcision sites in Migori and Rongo in Nyanza Province. FACES initially launched with one HIV site in Nairobi in September 2004 and second site in Kisumu in March 2005.

HIV Care and Treatment

FACES supports 62 HIV service sites in Western Kenya and Nairobi

- 60 sites in Nyanza Province, Western Kenya and 2 in Nairobi.
- A summary of enrolment and sites per district is below in Table 1.

Prevention of Parent-to-Child Transmission (PPCT)

FACES supports 62 PPCT sites in Migori, Rongo, and Kisumu East Districts, Nyanza Province, Western Kenya:

- In this reporting year, beginning October 2009, HIV counseling, testing, and results has reached 7,397 women, 15% of whom were HIV-positive. Over 95% of HIV+ women and their exposed infants have received ARV prophylaxis within antenatal and maternity services to help prevent HIV transmission to their infant.

Voluntary Medical Male Circumcision (VMMC)

FACES supports Voluntary Medical Male Circumcision (VMMC) services to help prevent HIV infection. Adult Voluntary Medical Male Circumcision (VMMC) services launched with 1 site in Migori in October 2008 and second site in Rongo by March 2009. VMMC services are now December 2009

provided at 12 sites in Migori and Rongo. Infant VMMC started in Migori in June 2009. By 31 Dec 2009, 7,143 male circumcisions have been performed including 30 infant male circumcisions.

FACES is a collaboration between the Kenya Medical Research Institute (KEMRI) and the University of California, San Francisco (UCSF). FACES partners with District Health Management teams (DHMTs), City Councils, non-governmental organizations (NGOs), faith-based organizations, and private health facilities to provide family-focused, comprehensive HIV services which include provider initiated counseling and testing (PITC), family planning, PMTCT, STI and TB screening and care, prevention with positives activities, counseling, nutritional and social support. To increase local capacity, FACES provides targeted trainings, close mentorship, and Continuing Medical Education (CME) activities. In addition, *Uliza!* Clinicians' HIV Hotline provides HIV consultations via cellular phone to health care providers in real time.
