

# FACES

## Program Summary



Family AIDS Care and Education Services (FACES) is a family-focused, comprehensive HIV prevention, care, and treatment program with 63 supported HIV sites in Nyanza and Nairobi; 61 PMTCT sites in Nyanza; and 4 male circumcision sites in Migori and Rongo in Nyanza Province. FACES initially launched with one HIV site in Nairobi in September 2004 and second site in Kisumu in March 2005.

### HIV Care and Treatment

FACES supports 64 HIV service sites in Western Kenya and Nairobi

- 61 sites in Nyanza Province, Western Kenya and 2 in Nairobi.
- A summary of enrolment and sites per district is below in Table 1.

### Prevention of Parent-to-Child Transmission (PPCT)

FACES supports 61 PPCT sites in Migori, Rongo, and Kisumu East Districts, Nyanza Province, Western Kenya:

- In this reporting year, beginning October 2008, HIV counseling, testing, and results has reached 20,856 women, 16% of whom were HIV-positive. Ninety-two percent of HIV+ women have received ARV prophylaxis in the antenatal clinic and within overall maternal child health services, 76% of HIV+ women have received ARV prophylaxis to help prevent HIV transmission to their infant.

### Voluntary Medical Male Circumcision

FACES supports Voluntary Medical Male Circumcision (VMMC) services to help prevent HIV

infection. Adult VMMC services launched at Migori District Hospital in October 2008. Services have expanded to 4 facilities in all: 2 mobile clinics at Karungu and Muhura health centres in Migori District and to 1 static clinic in Rongo District at Rongo District Hospital. In June 2009, infant VMMC launched at Migori District Hospital. By 30 June 2009, over 2,200 adult VMMC and 13 infant VMMC had been performed.

FACES is a collaboration between the Kenya Medical Research Institute (KEMRI) and the University of California, San Francisco (UCSF). FACES partners with District Health Management teams (DHMTs), City Councils, non-governmental organizations (NGOs), faith-based organizations, and private health facilities to provide family-focused, comprehensive HIV services which include provider initiated counseling and testing (PITC), family planning, PMTCT, STI and TB screening and care, prevention with positives activities, counseling, nutritional and social support. To increase local capacity, FACES provides targeted trainings, close mentorship, and Continuing Medical Education (CME) activities. In addition, *Uliza!* Clinicians' HIV Hotline provides HIV consultations via cellular phone to health care providers in real time.
