Program Summary



Family AIDS Care and Education Services (FACES) is a family-focused, comprehensive HIV prevention, care, and treatment program with 88 supported HIV sites in Nyanza and Nairobi; 119 Prevention of Parent-to-Child Transmission (PPCT) sites in Nyanza; 12 static Voluntary Medical Male Circumcision (VMMC) sites in Nyanza; and 71 Provider Initiated Testing and Counseling (PITC) sites in Nairobi and Nyanza. FACES initially launched with one HIV site in Nairobi in September 2004 and second site in Kisumu in March 2005.

HIV Care and Treatment

FACES supports 88 HIV service sites in Western Kenya and Nairobi with 106,431 patients cumulatively enrolled and 42,451 patients cumulatively on ART.

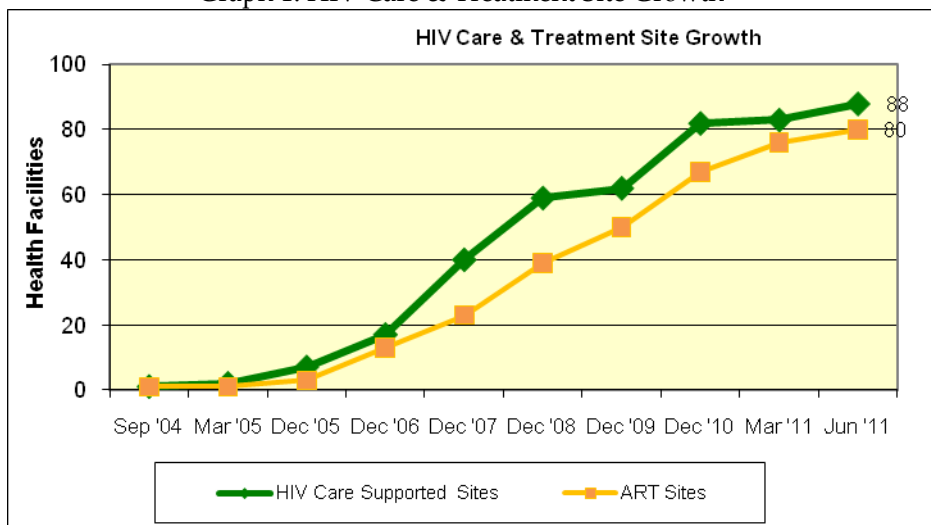
- 86 sites in Nyanza Province, Western Kenya and 2 in Nairobi.

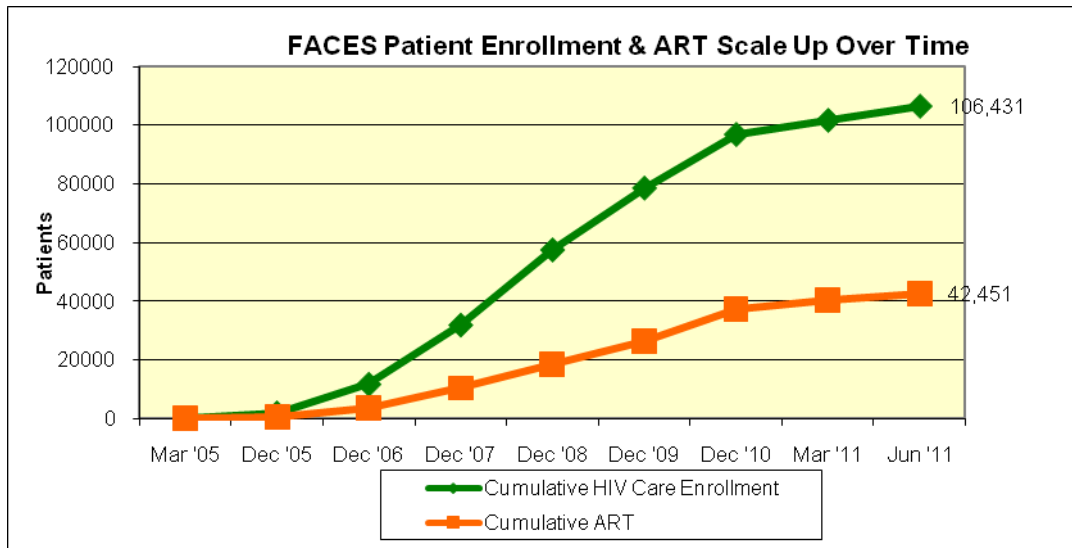

HIV Care and Treatment services have grown rapidly since 2005. Graphs 1 and 2 illustrate growth over time in terms of health facilities supported and patients enrolled and on antiretroviral treatment.

Graph 2: Patient Enrollment Scale Up



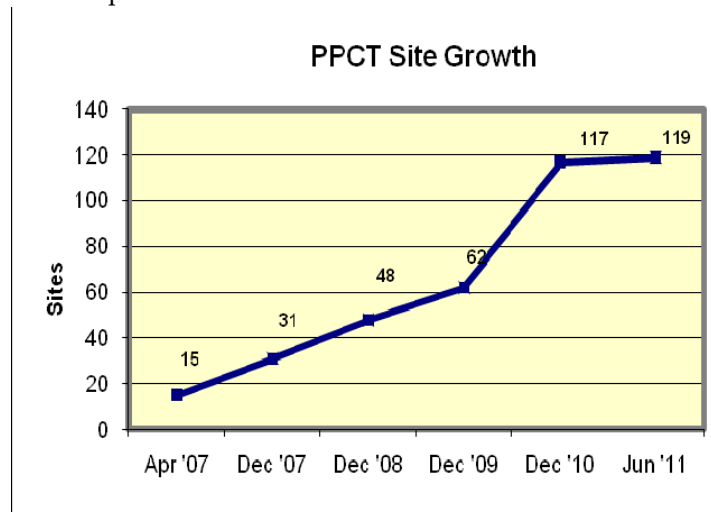
Prevention of Parent-to-Child Transmission (PPCT)

FACES supports 119 PPCT sites in Migori, Nyatike, Rongo, Suba, and Kisumu East Districts, Nyanza Province, Western Kenya:

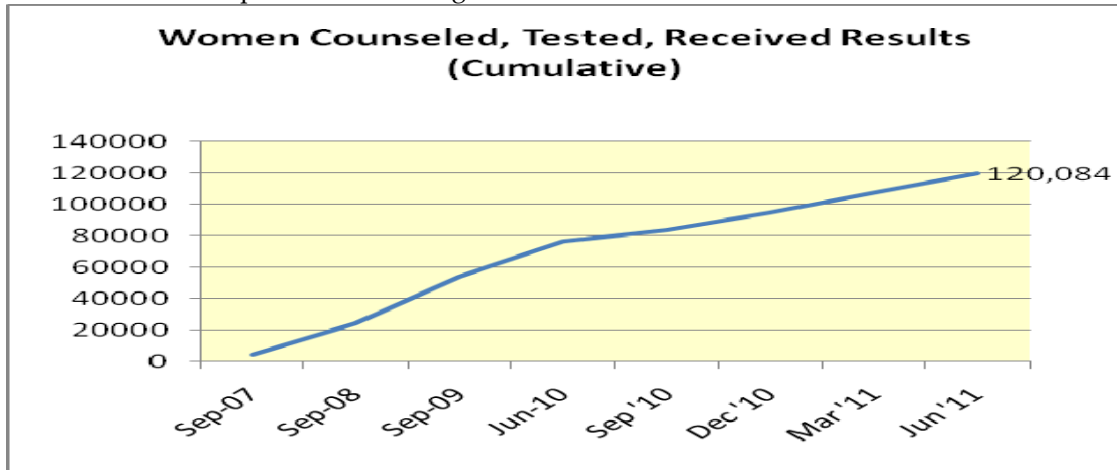
- During the last quarter, ending 6/11, HIV counseling, testing, and results reached 12,898 women, 17% of whom were HIV-positive. Over 85% of HIV+ women and 91% of their exposed infants received ARV prophylaxis to help prevent HIV transmission to their infants.

PPCT services have grown rapidly since services launched in 2007. Graphs 3 & 4 below show how the number of sites supported has sharply increased and how many women have been counseled, tested, and received results in Maternal Child Health (MCH) service departments.

Graph 4: PPCT Testing Reach

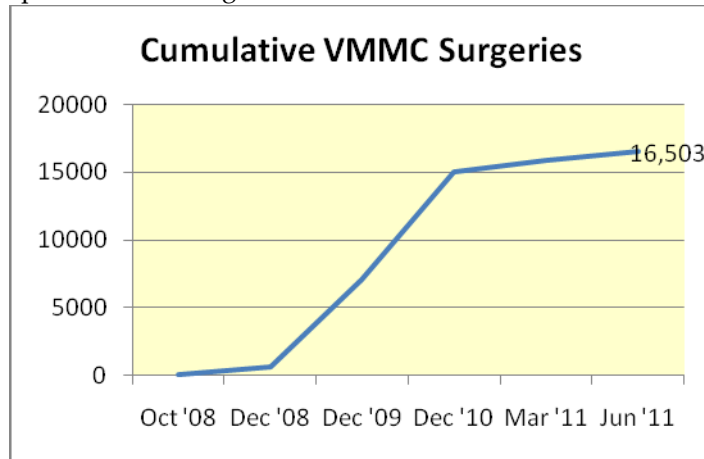


Voluntary Medical Male Circumcision (VMMC)

FACES supports Voluntary Medical Male Circumcision (VMMC) services at 12 district and sub-district hospitals in Nyanza to help prevent HIV infection. Adult and youth VMMC services launched with 1 site in Migori in October 2008, a second site in Rongo by March 2009, and Infant VMMC started in Migori in June 2009. During the past quarter, ending 6/11, VMMC services reached 587 males, including 5 infants.

VMMC services have reached 16,503 males since Oct '08. Graph 5 illustrates progress over time.

Graph 5: VMMC Surgeries Conducted

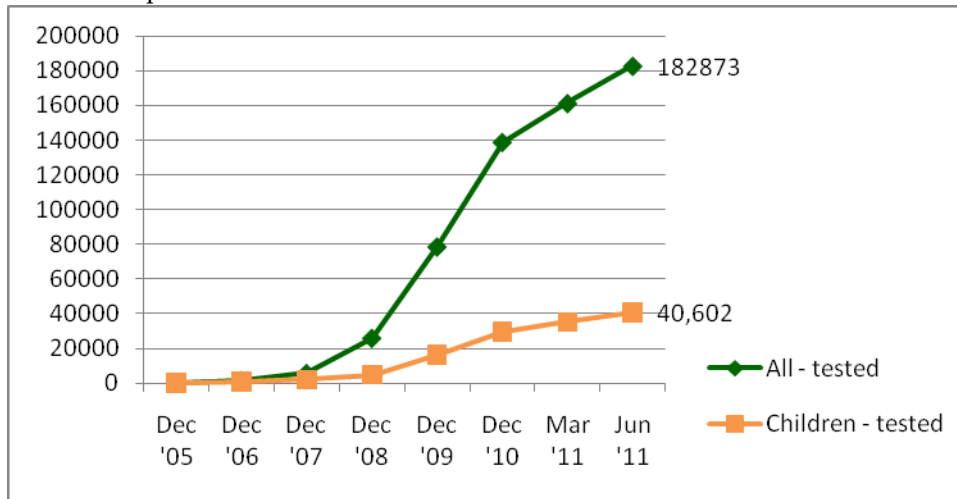


Provider Initiated Testing and Counseling (PITC)

FACES supports facility-based Provider Initiated Testing and Counseling (PITC) in Nairobi, Migori, Nyatike, Rongo, and Kisumu East Districts in Nairobi and Nyanza. During the past quarter, ending 6/11, PITC reached 21,493 patients including 5,403 children, among which 18% of adults and 7% of children were HIV positive.

Since PITC services launched in 2005, PITC has reached 182,873 patients as illustrated in the graph below.

FACES is a collaboration between the Kenya Medical Research Institute (KEMRI) and the University of California, San Francisco (UCSF). FACES partners with District Health Management teams (DHMTs), City Councils, non-governmental organizations (NGOs), faith-based organizations, and private health facilities to provide family-focused, comprehensive HIV services which include PITC, family planning, PPCT, STI and TB screening and care, prevention with positives activities, counseling, nutritional and social support. To increase local capacity, FACES provides targeted trainings, close mentorship, and Continuing Medical Education (CME) activities. In addition, *Uliza!* Clinicians' HIV Hotline provides HIV consultations via cellular phone to health care providers in real time.
