

A family-focused, comprehensive HIV prevention, care, and treatment program

Program Summary

In September 2004, the Kenya Medical Research Institute (KEMRI) and University of California, San Francisco (UCSF), supported by the President’s Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR)/Centers for Disease Control (CDC), launched Family AIDS Care and Education Services (FACES) in Nairobi and in Nyanza Province by March 2005. As one of the PEPFAR local partners in Kenya, FACES works to support the Kenyan Ministries of Health (MoH) in the implementation of quality HIV services including Prevention of Parent-to-Child Transmission (PPCT), Voluntary Medical Male Circumcision (VMMC), and Provider Initiated Testing and Counseling (PITC) services at public, private, and faith-based health facilities; by providing training, clinical mentorship, logistical support, community engagement activities; as well as employing lay health workers based at peripheral sites and provision of salary support for MoH health workers.



FACES support extends to 100 HIV care and 92 ART sites in Nairobi and Nyanza; 123 PPCT sites in Nyanza; 12 static VMMC sites in Nyanza; and 117 PITC sites in Nairobi and Nyanza. FACES initially launched with a single site in Nairobi in September 2004 and a second site in Kisumu, Kenya in March 2005.

HIV Care and Treatment

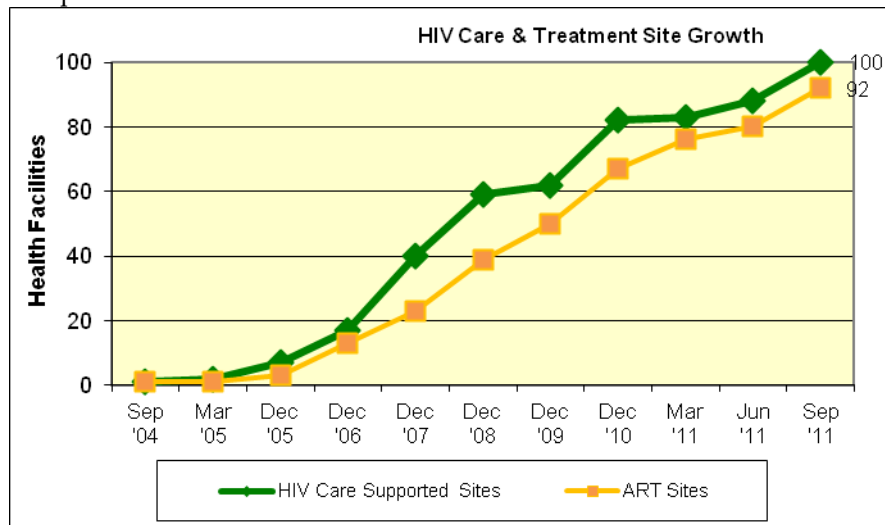
- 100 supported HIV care sites: 2 in Nairobi and 98 in Nyanza Province
- 92 supported ART sites: 2 in Nairobi and 90 in Nyanza Province
- 111,004 patients cumulatively enrolled in HIV Care
- 44,967 patients cumulatively initiated on ART.

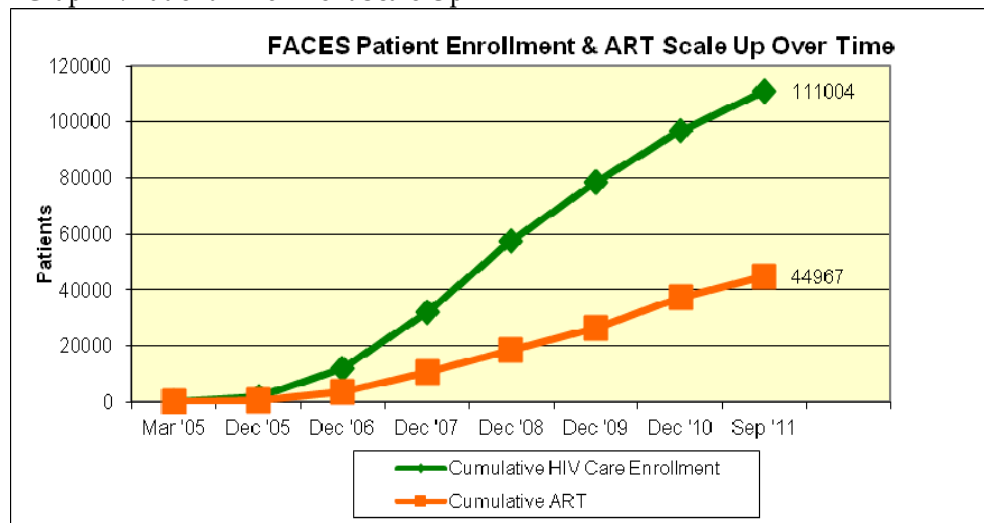

HIV Care and Treatment services have grown rapidly since 2005. Graphs 1 and 2 illustrate decentralization over time.

Graph 2: Patient Enrollment Scale Up

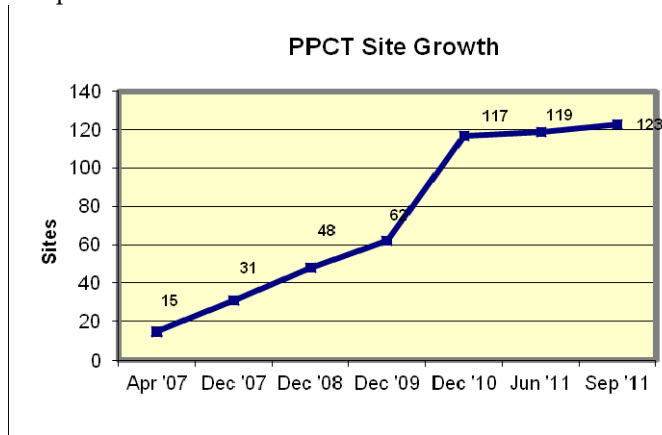


Prevention of Parent-to-Child Transmission (PPCT)

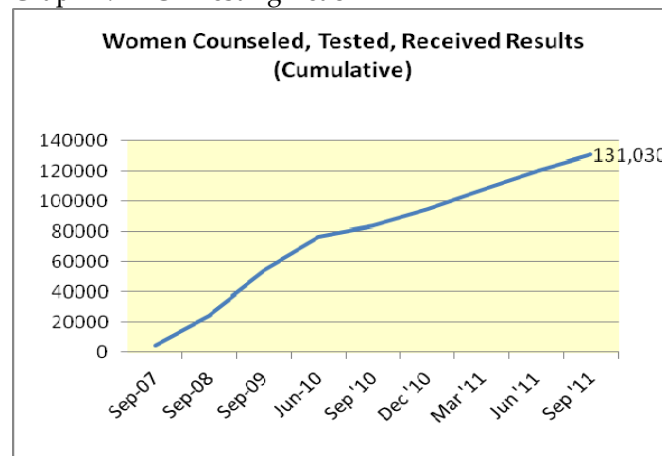
- 123 supported PPCT sites in Nyanza Province
- 131,030 women cumulatively HIV counseled, tested, and received results in Maternal Child Health (MCH) services since 2007
- 10,946 women HIV counseled, tested, and received results in MCH in the last quarter
 - 16% were HIV positive
 - 89% of HIV positive women and 95% of their exposed infants received ARV prophylaxis to prevent HIV transmission to their infants

PPCT services have grown rapidly since services launched in 2007. Graphs 3 & 4 illustrate service decentralization and testing reach since 2007.

Graph 3: PPCT Site Growth



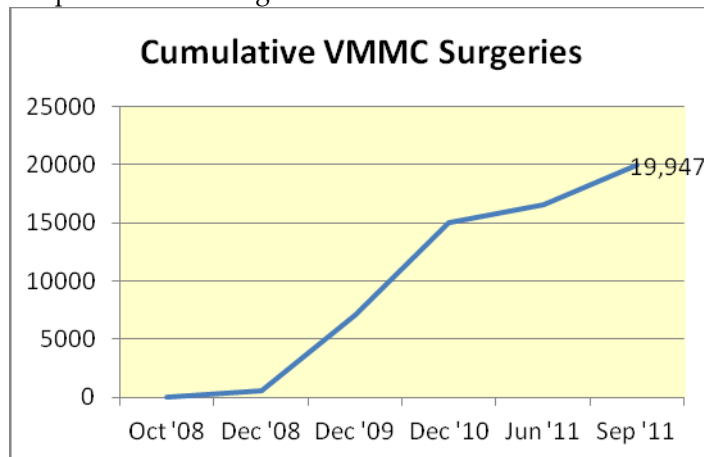
Graph 4: PPCT Testing Reach



Voluntary Medical Male Circumcision (VMMC)

- 12 district and sub-district hospitals supported for VMMC services in Nyanza Province to help prevent HIV infection
- First site launched in Migori in October 2008 and infant services started in June 2009
- 19,947 VMMC procedures conducted cumulatively since 2008 (see graph 5)
- 3,444 VMMC procedures conducted during the last quarter, including 6 infants

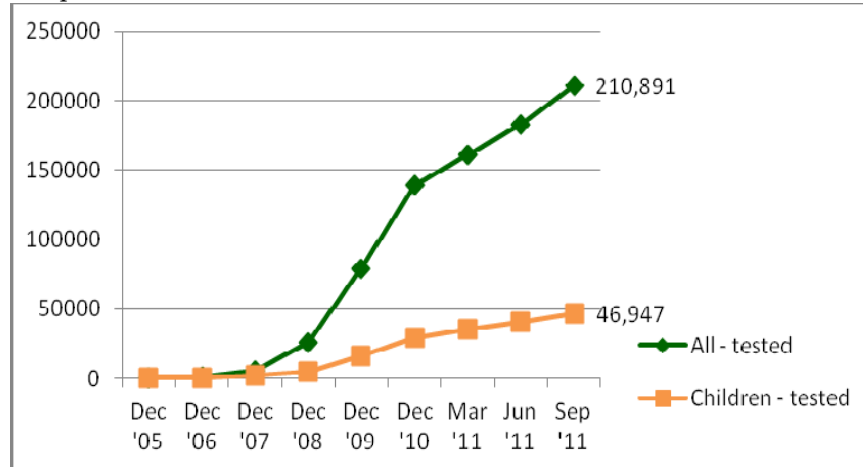
Graph 5: VMMC Surgeries Conducted



Provider Initiated Testing and Counseling (PITC)

- 117 sites supported for PITC in Nairobi and Nyanza Province
- 210,891 patients cumulatively tested and counseled for HIV since 2005 (graph 6).
- 28,018 patients, including 6,345 children, tested and counseled for HIV in the last quarter.
- 13% of all were HIV positive (6% of children were HIV positive)

Comprehensive services extend to STI and TB screening and care, prevention with positives activities; counseling; nutritional, social, and community support. To increase local capacity, FACES provides targeted trainings, close mentorship, and Continuing Medical Education (CME) activities. In addition, *Uliza!* Clinicians' HIV Hotline provides HIV consultations via cellular phone to health care providers in real time.
